







Patricia Blackstock grew up in Toronto and inherited the genealogy bug from her mother as a young child. She is a retired teacher with a love for learning about the history of her family and the country in which they lived. She is presently working on her last course to become a certified professional genealogist. She is an active member of the King Township Historical Society and past president of the Tecumseth – West Gwillimbury Historical Society. Her Pringle family settled in King Township around 1830 and she has tracked them to the present. She volunteers at the Royal Ontario Museum taking the public on walking tours of various areas in Toronto, talking about the architecture, history of the area and some of the people who lived there. Taking people on tours around Montgomery's Inn is one of her new ventures. An avid interest in the 1837 Rebellion developed as a result of learning that she had six direct ancestors and numerous peripheral family members in it. On the 175th anniversary of the rebellion, she volunteered to compile the names of York Region rebels for the York Region Genealogical Society. She has amassed an extensive database of York Region rebels and is delighted to have the opportunity to share this information with you.



A Comprehensive History of King Township



In late November, the Board of Directors of your Society announced the decision to commission a new book on the history of King Township. We are negotiating with Kelly Mathews, author of the new and acclaimed *The Road to Marylake* as well as *Eaton Hall: Pride of King Township* and the KTHS newsletter to be our author.

Kelly has served on the board of the King Township Historical Society for several years but stepped down from the Board on January 31st, 2018 to negotiate her contract and then focus on writing the book.

The book will cover, in detail, the story of our community – major events and overarching themes from the issuing of the first land grant in 1797 to the end of the second world war. A prologue will discuss what is known about pre-European settlement and the last chapter will summarize the dramatic changes since 1945.

The book will be well illustrated with photos and maps, many of which will be digitized for the first time, from the Provincial, National and Township Archives.

The style will be thorough but readable – the author will draw interesting stories out of the material, as is her trademark. We are not looking for a scholarly work with detailed footnotes but we are planning a good index so that the book will be accessible to students of all kinds.

We will be seeking a high-profile Canadian to write the forward.

Professionally designed and published, the book should be the perfect gift to give on behalf of King Township, for realtors and other business people to offer appropriate customers, and most of all, for all residents to consult and showcase in their homes.

This is a legacy project, initiated by your Board of Directors on behalf of the Society in the year of Canada's 150th anniversary, as an offering to the community to celebrate our roots.

Of a budget of \$65,000, the Society is putting in \$25,000 saved from previous donations, membership fees, and Christmas Concerts. And the Township has stepped forward with an additional \$25,000 from the Mayor's Discretionary Fund made up of earnings from his annual golf tournament. Approval of the Township contribution came in unanimous decision at King Council in early January.

Will you join us in funding this project? Please consider a donation of \$50, \$100, \$500 – in fact any amount would be appreciated as we look to raise the last \$15,000 to reach our goal.

Every penny raised will go towards the creation of this book – research, writing, and publishing. If we are so lucky as to raise a little more than our target, that money will all go to further enhancing the book as well as marketing and promotion.

As a registered charity, we provide a receipt for income tax purposes. Donations of \$250 or more will be acknowledged (listed as patrons of the book) if they wish.

UNCOVERED

106 Year Old Inscription Discovered at the King Township Museum

Hidden behind a black slate chalkboard, unannounced to all, was a simple phrase delicately handwritten in white chalk: "Covered by new board Jan. 17, 1912"

Imagine the excitement of the King Township Museum staff when contractors uncovered this 106 year old inscription while starting the preliminary stage of renovations to the Kinghorn schoolroom.


Prior to this discovery, we had been (half jokingly) making comments to one another about finding a hidden treasure in our schoolroom during the renovations. Little did we know that we were about to stumble upon an inscription that was patiently waiting to be discovered.

The inscription, although it may seem simple in character, exhibits the modest effort made by someone 106 years ago to record an architectural change within the Kinghorn schoolroom that they felt should be remembered. Ironically, its discovery has come during a time of large scale renovations and changes that are currently being made to the space.

The Kinghorn Schoolroom was built in 1861 and served as a school until its closure in the late 1970's. Today, the schoolroom is the foundation of the King Township Museum and represents the historic value of the site.

In May 2017, the King Museum received the Canada Cultural Spaces Fund, a federal grant from the Canadian Heritage Services issued to improve heritage and art facilities. With this grant, in addition to funding from the Fawcett Bequest and the Township, the Kinghorn Schoolroom will be undergoing impressive changes that will enhance the space by creating an interactive and permanent exhibit that outlines the history of King Township.

As we prepare for something new at our site, this inscription reminds us that recording changes throughout history plays an important role in preserving and contextualizing the past for future generations. We plan to conserve the inscription and incorporate it into our new exhibit.
